
Objectives of the Seminar



Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam can be treated as replacing the abovementioned ideologies entitled "Sociospiritual-harmonism" that can bridge the gap between horizontal and vortical imbalanced of all the areas of the society and make the society prosperous and happy with materialistic and spiritual development. Twenty first century is called the post-modern era. Modernity has created enormous environmental, ecological, and ethical challenges despite tremendous progress in science and technology and economic growth. To solve all the challenges in modernity: issues were divided into two parts: central issues, and the other is marginal issues. Major issues of modernity: issues. Major issues of modernity were an abstraction, futurity, individualism, liberation, secularization, foundationalism, acceptable and abstraction of the secularization of foundationalism, scientific rationality, ideology, freedom infamy etc. Marginal issues were irrationality, plurality, deception, demon, sin, murder, sexuality, madness, hospitals, fantasy, illusions, corruption, crimes, etc., but these marginal issues were not solved in modernity due to egocentric methodology of implementation of theories of policies. 
